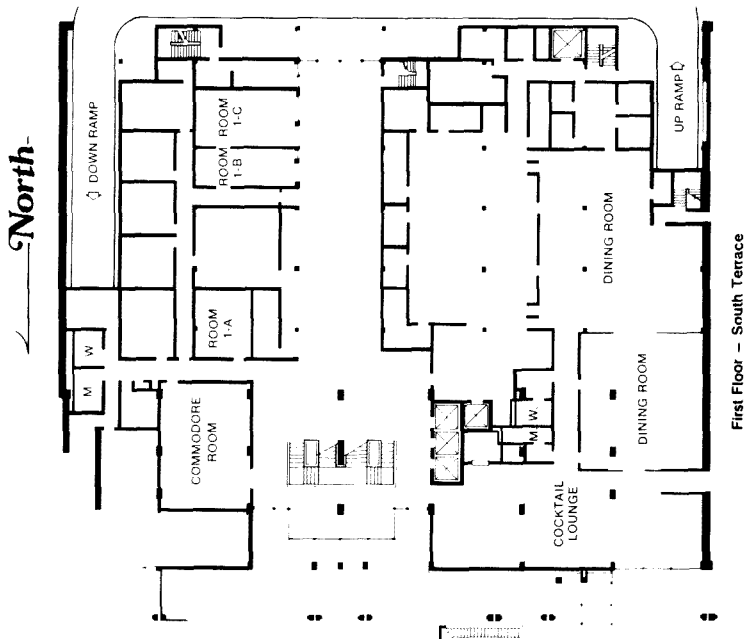

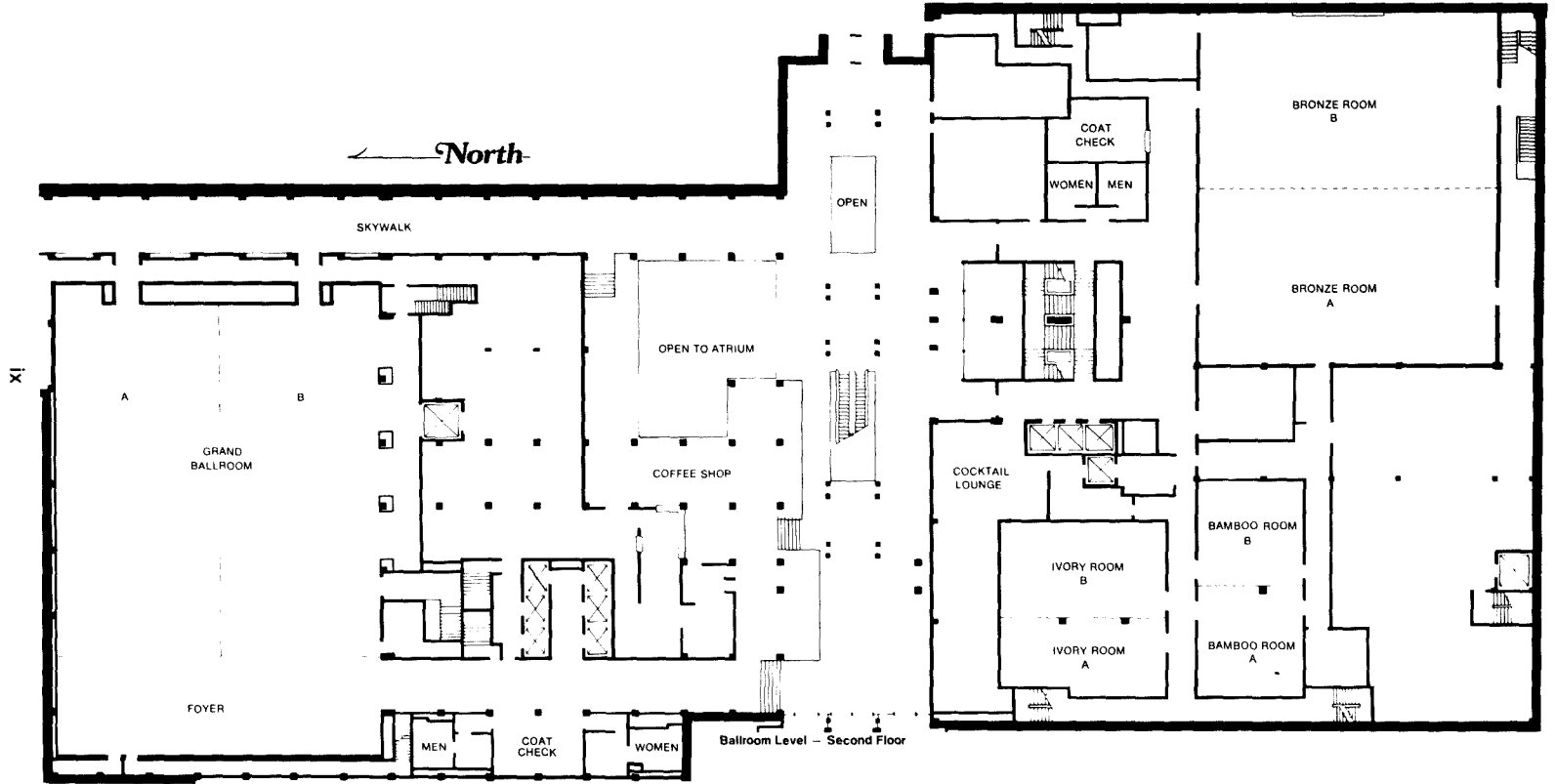

SESSION SMOKING BAN

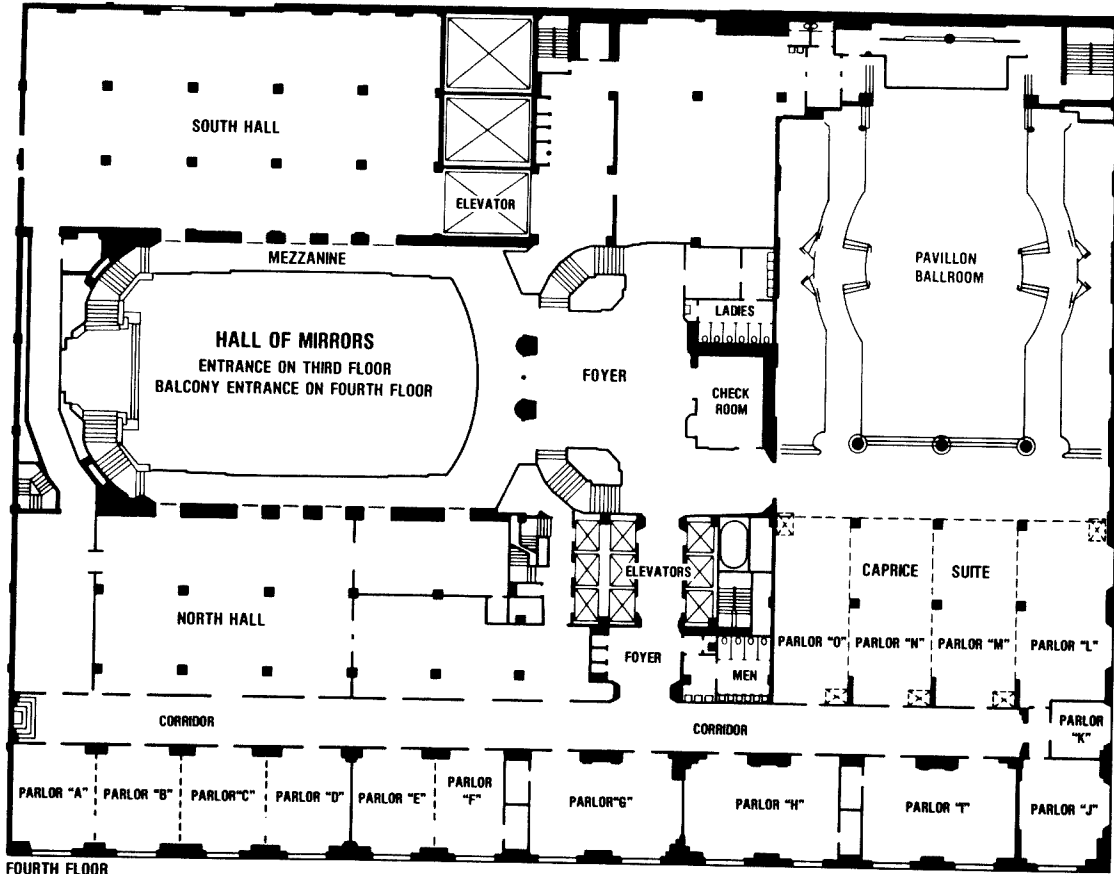
